VOTING IS IMPORTANT. INFORMING YOUR VOTE IS CRUCIAL.

Reading up and knowing where candidates stand on a variety of issues can help ensure your vote aligns with your values.

It also means you'll be equipped to hold elected officials accountable as they represent your voice in the House of Commons, and Canadian voices on the world stage.

Getting educated about the voting process, the candidates running and the issues at stake can be time-consuming, but it is worth it. Take comfort in knowing any new information you learn is a step towards a more informed vote... and that's great!

TIP 1: Know who's running
